Introduction

January Term, or J-Term, is an opportunity to recapture the curiosity of learning and explore experiential and project-based education. Some classes offer traditional educational applications, and others explore learning in venues that used to be included in a traditional liberal arts education. J-Term classes run for four days in January: January 2-5, 2024.

Students are expected to sign up for all three sessions A, B, and C. Course space is limited, so we're asking students to select a first and second choice from the options in each session. If a student's first two choices fill up, he/she will be contacted and asked for his/her third and fourth choices. NOTE: AP Classes have specific seminars for their courses. Please note the times these are happening, and sign up for J-Term courses accordingly.

Students earn transcript elective credit in the areas of Fine Arts, Common Arts, and Physical Education for their J-Term. These courses are graded on a Pass/Fail basis and punctual attendance, participation, and completion of work are expected, as they are for every one of our class offerings. If a student misses days due to illness or other excused reasons that will not allow him or her to pass the course, they will be removed from the course so as not to fail, but they will not have enough days to earn credit.

The week is intended for students to engage in work that broadens their academic, experiential, and spiritual interests in order to augment the traditional academic experience at Front Range Christian School and to further advance our progress towards achieving our mission of training and equipping students to impact the world for Christ.

J-Term Schedule

January 2-5, 2024

Unlike past years, there is no introductory assembly this J-Term. Students report to the session classes each day of the term. The schedule is:

- Session A: 8-10am
- Session B: 10:15-12:15
- Lunch: 12:15-1pm
- Session C: 1-3pm

How to Sign Up for the Courses

Students should review this course catalog and pick two in each time slot that sound interesting to them. Just as for semester electives at the end of the summer, students will request J-Term courses through the Family Portal. Course requests for 2024 J-Term open Tuesday, November 28, and close the evening of Monday, December 4. NOTE: This is a quick turnaround, therefore please make this a priority so that we can get students all placed accordingly.

When you login to Family Portal during this time period, you will be asked to select a first and second choice from each session. Class space is limited, and we will do our best to enroll each student into at least one of their top two choices.

AP Seminars

- · REQUIRED for AP students
- · Fee: none

This week provides the opportunity for AP classes to commune, practice, engage, and sharpen. Due to the rigorous nature of the requirements dictated by the College Board, these seminars allow for further growth in skills required to be successful on the AP Exam. This includes: Extended labs, Practice Exams (Multiple Choice and FRQs), analysis of texts, and advanced discussion. AP instructors will provide further information for their course during class time. AP students should not sign up for any other courses during the appropriate session as listed below.

JUNIOR HIGH OPTIONS

ALL DAY COURSE

Shredding (Skiing & Snowboarding)

- Fee: Participants required to have lift ticket or pass for Winter Park or Copper Mountain

From the engineering behind ancient siege weapons to the elegance of medieval swords to the power of modern firearms, we will discover the stories behind the weapons that defined their eras. We will build models, watch movie clips, and discuss historical strategy.

A History of Music & the Western World

How has music ended up where it is today? What world events contributed to it? From where did all the genres that we know come? In this course we offer a flash review of the development of music in the Western Hemisphere (Middle East - Europe - America), cross-reference important sociopolitical and historical events, and analyze the geopolitical changes that made music what it is today. This course encompasses classical music in the church, contemporary genres, and all the important changes in different centuries since the beginning of time (Genesis 1:1).

Into the Wardrobe: C.S. Lewis and Narnia

• Fee: \$5 (for materials)

 Prerequisite: In order to participate in this course, students will need to have read *The Lion*, the Witch, and the Wardrobe in the weeks prior to the first day of class.

This course revolves around the most famous book of C.S. Lewis's famous *Chronicles of Narnia* series, *The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe*. In the course, we'll discuss the book, as well as the life of C.S. Lewis, the precursors of Narnia in Lewis's own childhood, and Lewis's understanding of the place of fantasy literature in the lives of children and adults. We will watch and discuss the feature-length film produced by Walden Media, sample various flavors of Turkish Delight, and explore the connections between the lives of the book's characters and our own lives of faith.

Money 101

Money can be a sensitive topic, especially in the Christian world. Isn't the "love of money" the "root of all evil"? Yet doesn't Jesus tell us to use worldly wealth to gain friends? The messages around money can be confusing, and the teachings around money can be misleading at best. Are we simply meant to go to college, get a job, earn money and retire? There's so much more to it than that! In this course, we will learn about building a business rather than simply having a job. We'll learn about working in your gifts and using your work as your mission field. We'll discuss various investments and ways to put your money to work for you, and how taxation can affect your wealth. This course is perfect for everyone who is interested in business, economics, real estate, investing, and how we can use our wealth to build God's Kingdom.

Brain Games

Have you ever seen the show Brain Games? FRCS proudly presents Mrs. Jones as your host of our version of Brain Games! This J-term course explores the neuroscience of a variety of topics including sleep, memory, learning, joy, and more. We'll explore these topics through illusions, experiments, videos, and lecture.

Building Higher Walls or Bigger Tables: Immigration, the Bible, and Us

Immigration is a highly controversial, politicized and often polarizing topic in our nation. We invite students to move beyond the media headlines and hype to gain a better understanding of how migration affects nations, societies and people today. This course explores immigration in the US (our history and the current situation), the similarities and differences between immigrants, migrants, refugees, asylees, illegal aliens, undocumented people, foreigners and VOT, and how the Bible addresses migration and the way God's people are invited to relate to foreigners and "outsiders"

Students taking this course also interact with and hear stories from those who have been forcibly displaced from their homes and seek to better understand their lived experiences as foreigners coming into the United States.

Insightignite: Youth Mind Mastery

- Fee: \$10 (for materials)

Sometimes it can feel like we are just stuck in our thoughts and our feelings. This course focuses on building resilience, enhancing coping skills, and fostering a sense of community among students. In this course, we use evidence-based CBT techniques with interactive activities, providing a safe space for students to explore and navigate their emotions. Through peer support, skill-building activities, and creative expression, the hope is for the students to thrive emotionally and mentally in the face of life's challenges. Join us on this journey of self-discovery and well-being.

Intro to Film and Media

Bible Meets Media: We'll explore how the Bible's timeless wisdom can be seen in the movies we watch.

Show Me the Money!

Welding 101

Have you ever looked at two pieces of metal that were fused together and questioned how they got there? This class helps you to answer that question. This course teaches the science behind how welding works, how to safely operate the welding machine, and the different mechanisms to fuse metal together. By the end of the week, you will be fluent in terms and skills needed to become a welder.

SESSION C COURSES

Crafting a Chess Board

• Fee: \$50 (for materials)

Imagine two friends want to duel you in a game of chess, one has a dainty old plastic chess board with broken pieces. The other, a beautifully crafted wooden board with custom 3D-printed chess pieces. Whose board would you rather play on? In this course each student carefully designs and creates their own custom chess board and pieces. Students will walk away learning important craftsman skills like: how to safely operate machinery (table saw, planar etc...), how to correctly glue up wood, and how to 3D print objects.

For the Love of Volleyball

Love volleyball but never have time to play? Or want to try out a new sport? Come review the basics of volleyball and find the joy of being active with your friends. During this class we'll learn the rules of the game, practice foundational skills and scrimmage, all for the pure love of volleyball. No pressure and minimal competition. Let's all come together around this game we love for the pure enjoyment of community.

Sewing

• Fee: \$30 (for materials)

This course takes you through the basic elements of using a sewing machine and following a simple pattern. Projects include pot holders, pillowcases, and tote bags. The course fee covers all fabric and thread supplies. If you have a sewing machine of your own, it is recommended that you bring it to school for J-Term. There will be several sewing machines available to those who do not have one. When finished with this course, students will have learned a new skill/hobby.

In this course, students transform their own face into different animals, monsters, and popular movie characters, along with learning how to create realistic looking wounds and more! Come discover what you can do when you become the artist and your face becomes the art!

Learn the necessary skills to help yourself and others survive in adverse conditions away from civilization. This course is a mixture of in-classroom instruction as well as plenty of practical experiences. Students will walk away with a greater understanding of how to use the nature around them to create shelter, fire, and food to sustain themselves. The fee covers the cost of gear and some food during the week.
