The elementary switched math curriculum to i-Ready Classroom Mathematics to help K-6 students engage more with math leading to a better understanding.



hrough ongoing biblical stewardship efforts, FRCS again finished its fiscal year exceeding budget projections in many areas. Through our commitment to the guidelines laid out for us as members of the Evangelical Council for Financial Accountability (ECFA), the generosity of our families, and God's incredible provision, we had another great year.

FRCS's cash reserves sit at \$2,367,770. These reserves, bolstered by previous donations, have allowed us to weather challenging circumstances created by the global pandemic while still moving forward with important projects such as the creation of a new elementary classroom, remodeling the Elementary Activity Room, and a new technology lab.

FRCS undergoes a full audit annually. Copies of the audit are available for your review by contacting our finance department. Our audit is conducted in October of each year and available for review in the spring. We have a stellar record and follow generally accepted accounting principles.
